"On the 28th of May 2025, our newly introduced prefects, as well as the class representatives of the three Form Four classes, accompanied by their Dean, Ms. Hitlal attended an anti-bullying program held at NAPA. In this event, the students from multiple schools participated in several activities with trained professionals. This event, hosted by Caribbean Colour Splash and sponsored by Popeyes, Oasis Premium Purified Water, and Fruitopia provided the students with the following key information:

What is Bullying?

Bullying refers to repeated aggressive behaviour that causes harm, injury, or discomfort to someone.

Types of Bullying:

- Cyberbullying
- Psychological/Emotional Bullying
- Physical Bullying
- Verbal Bullying
- Social Bullying

Why do people bully?

Though bullying is a cruel and intolerable act of cruelty, persons may bully others as a way of projecting or coping with internal issues such as low self-esteem, depression, or certain environmental factors at home.

How to deal with a bully:

- Ensure that you make it clear that you do not like the behaviour of the bully and you would like them to stop.
- Ensure that you report incidents to a trusted adult like a teacher or parent.
- Keep a record of the dates, times, and details of the incidents so when you do report you can be specific and clear.
- Build a strong core support system made up of your friend group, family, and professionals like a counsellor if necessary to help you through the situation.

Helping Her Foundation is a local non-profit organization committed to menstrual equity in Trinidad and Tobago. Founded in 2015, we believe that everyone deserves access to basic menstrual products, regardless of their circumstances. Our mission is to promote health, dignity, and empowerment by distributing menstrual products and providing education to individuals, shelters, schools, and community organizations. In 2024, we supported over 1,168 individuals across the country, including eight shelters: Sophia House for Girls, St. Dominic's Children's Home, Swah Vishok Bhavan Children's Home, St. Mary's Children's Home, Raffa House for Girls, Christ Child Convalescent Home, The Lady Hochoy Home (Gasparillo), and Serenity Place.

In a society where menstruation is still treated as a taboo, many face unnecessary barriers to accessing essential hygiene products. We are committed to breaking these stigmas and ensuring that menstruation does not hinder anyone's ability to thrive.


After graduating in 2009, I graduated in 2015 - Cum


